

To order a copy of the standard under consideration, go to International Safety Equipment Association webpage. There is \$40 charge for the public review copy.

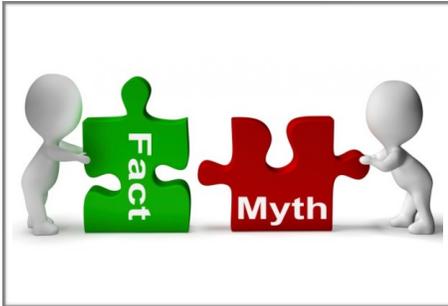


Breast Cancer

Breast cancer is one of the most common kinds of cancer in women. About 1 in 8 women born today in the United States will get breast cancer at some point.

The good news is that most people can survive breast cancer if it's found and treated early. A mammogram – the screening test for breast cancer – can help find breast cancer early when it's easier to treat.





Hearing Loss Myths

Myth1: My doctor will tell me if have hearing loss.

False. Only around 1 in 10 doctors check for hearing loss. When was the last time your doctor asked you to participate in a hearing test. Unless you ask about it, your primary doctor will most likely not identify any changes in your hearing.

Myth 2: My hearing loss won't affect my overall health.

False. As a primary factor in our ability to communicate, hearing loss has been found to lead to social isolation and depression. In turn, hearing impairments can also increase your chances of acquiring dementia.

Myth 4: Hearing loss is a normal part of aging.

False. Age related hearing loss has the potential to begin as early as 30 and will impact most of us by the age of 80.

Myth 5: Hearing loss cannot be prevented.

False. Noise induced hearing loss is preventable. Taking measures to protect your hearing, such as wearing hearing protection in noisy environments.

National Breast Cancer Awareness Month is a chance to raise awareness about the importance of finding breast cancer early. Make a difference! Spread the word about mammograms, and encourage communities, organizations, families, and individuals to get involved.

Myths About Breast Cancer

- Myth: Drinking milk (or dairy) causes breast cancer
- Myth: Finding a lump in your breast means you have breast cancer
- Myth: Men do not get breast cancer; it affects women only
- Myth: A mammogram can cause breast cancer to spread
- Myth: If you have a family history of breast cancer, you are likely to develop breast cancer, too
- Myth: Breast cancer is contagious
- Myth: If the gene mutation BRCA1 or BRCA2 is detected in your DNA, you will definitely develop breast cancer

Facts

In 2019, an estimated 268,600 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in women in the U.S. as well as 62,930 new cases of non-invasive (in situ) breast cancer.

62% of breast cancer cases are diagnosed at a localized stage, for which the 5-year survival rate is 99%.

This year, an estimated 41,760 women will die from breast cancer in the U.S.



Although rare, men get breast cancer too. The lifetime risk for U.S. men is about 1 in 1,000.

An estimated 2,670 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer this year in the United States and approximately 500 will die.

There are over 3.5 million breast cancer survivors in the United States.

On average, every 2 minutes a woman is diagnosed with breast cancer in the United States.

Female breast cancer represents 15.2% of all new cancer cases in the U.S.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in American women, except for skin cancers.

Did you know there are more than one million fires reported in the U.S. every year? These fires caused thousands of deaths and injuries - and billions of dollars in property damage - that could have been prevented.

With the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) observing Fire Prevention Week October 6th - 12th, now is a great time to remind your employees about fire hazards in the workplace and what to do in case of a fire.

By the Numbers

An estimated total of **4,500** Halloween related injuries from October through November 2017.

41% were related to pumpkin carving activities.

32% were due to falls while putting up or taking down decorations, tripping on costumes, or just walking while trick-or-treating.

22% of the injuries included lacerations, ingestions, and other costume, pumpkin or decoration related injuries.

5% were due to allergic reactions or rashes.
